DIRECTIONS TO 1745 HAGERSON RD, SUGAR LAND, TX

Important note: The old route (which still sometimes shows on GPS) is closed. The intersection of Thompson Ferry Rd and Hagerston Rd is closed, so do not follow any directions that take you to Thompson Ferry Rd. Also, law enforcement officers on FM 1092 and LJ Parkway are quite diligent about enforcing speed limits, so mind your speed.

FROM HOUSTON: Take US 59 south one exit past Sam Houston Tollway to FM 1092/Murphy Road. Turn left on FM 1092 (FM 1092 is called Wilcrest north of US 59). After 6.5 miles (at Hwy) FM 1092 becomes University Blvd. Proceed 1.4 miles on University Blvd. Turn left on LJ Parkway (CVS on corner). Proceed 1.1 miles. Turn right on Hagerston Rd. Proceed 1 mile. 1745 is 1 mile on the left.

FROM SOUTHEAST HOUSTON/CLEAR LAKE/PEARLAND: Take Hwy 6 north to Sienna Parkway (HEB on corner). Turn left on Sienna Pkwy. Proceed 0.5 miles. Turn right on Sienna Springs. After 1.5 miles, Sienna Springs becomes L.J. Pkwy. Proceed 1.2 miles on L.J. Pkwy. Turn left on Hagerston Rd. 1745 is 1 mile on the left.

FROM KATY: Take TX 99/Grand Parkway south to US 59. Turn north (left) on US 59. Proceed 1.7 miles. Exit University Blvd. Turn right on University Blvd. Proceed 5.4 miles on University Blvd. Turn right on LJ Parkway (CVS on corner). Proceed 1.1 miles. Turn right on Hagerston Rd. Proceed 1 mile. 1745 in 1 mile on the left.

KERRVILLE FALL MUSIC FESTIVAL

Welcome Home! The Kerrville Fall Music Festival (affectionately referred to as “Little Folk” by those who attend the 18 day festival in May-June) runs from September 2 through September 4, Labor Day weekend. The Kerrville Festival Foundation invites you to “experience the music, the legacy, the family.

This year’s performers include Ray Wylie Hubbard, Ellis Paul, Joe Jenks, Ronny Cox and many more. (see the full lineup at <http://www.kerrvillefolkfestival.org/#!fall-fest-performers/adv0v>.) In addition to these evening main stage performers, the festival provides diverse daytime events including the Ballad Tree (where KFF provides the best un-amplified open mic around), “Music Camp for Teens Showcase” (led by Houston’s beloved Ken Gaines, and more), a Craft Beer Seminar and a Texas Wine Seminar. And, of course, campfires after the evening concert are surrounded by good friends and good music-making. The Kerrville Fall Music Festival is located on Quiet Valley Ranch on Hwy 16 about nine miles south of Kerrville. So, hurry up and pack !

45th WALNUT VALLEY MUSIC FESTIVAL

The Walnut Valley Music Festival is a long way from Houston but well worth the drive! There will be at least a few HFMS members making their annual trek to this fabulous festival. Often referred to as “Picker’s Paradise”, the festival runs from September 14 through 18 in Winfield, Kansas, featuring many of the nation’s (and a few international) best pickers of just about every string instrument you can think of. Starting as a bluegrass festival in 1972, the festival has evolved and now features bluegrass, mountain, old time, Ozark, original singer-songwriter, traditional Irish, and some music styles that defy categorization. Favorite artists appearing this year include Tom Chapin, Dan Crary, John McCutcheon, Tim O’Brien, Mark O’Connor, Socks in the Frying Pan, The Steel Wheels, Still on the Hill and dozens more.

Additional major events of the festival include championship competitions. Along with National Flat Pick Championships and International Finger Style Championships, the Walnut Valley Festival hosts the International Autoharp, National Mandolin, National Mountain Dulcimer, National

Hammered Dulcimer, National Bluegrass Banjo, and Walnut Valley Old Time Fiddle Championships. Over the course of years, the contests at Winfield have attracted more than 3,000 contestants from all 50 states as well as many foreign countries.

After the festival's four simultaneously running stages close after midnight, the picking continues all night in the campgrounds, where we can all share our voices and other instruments with fellow campers. Like many festivals, this is the favorite part of the festival for some people. Of course, there are alternative lodging choices in the area (see <https://wvfest.com/camping/alternatives>). In addition, Walnut Valley features children's shows and activities, as well as one of the best arts and crafts shows in the country. In sum, this is an amazing event!

WE COME FORTH TO SING

The words of Gibson, Wright and Young

Some come to dance, and some come to play
Some merely come to pass time away
Some come to laugh, their voices do ring
But as for me, I come for to sing

Glenn Yarbrough and Marilyn Child released a recording of this song in 1958. They called it "We Come For To Sing" rather than "I". The choice of pronouns represents the spirit of the times which promoted many folks picking up a guitar, banjo or mandolin, and singing the songs they were hearing. Glenn Yarbrough was the lead singer for the Limelickers from 1959 to 1963. Their performances were in part one of the sparks that caused the flames of the folk revival of the 1960's. Lou Gottlieb, their bassist and comic spokesman, proclaimed the Limelickers were so popular, they came dangerously close to "financial solvency". Glenn Yarbrough left us this past month, and we can be so grateful that he and other talented individuals lit the flame for us all.

USER REVIEW - THALIA CAPO

Capos- We musicians love 'em. I guess we couldn't live without them. How else could we play a song in, say, F#, if that's the key needed for our voice? We know they come in all styles- the elastic strap kind, the Kyser spring-loaded kind, the Shubb over-center cam-action kind, some that combine a tuner with a capo, the screw-down kind, the G7 kind, and many others.



Recently, Andy Longo clued me in to a new brand/type of capo that I had not been aware of- the Thalia capo. I checked their web site and I was intrigued. Rita offered to get me one, so I said "sure" (thanks, Rita).

The Thalia capos are characterized by the following-

- They have a wide-enough flat surface to have a decorative inlay. They are available with a wide selection of exotic wood and shell inlays.
- They are available in three metal finishes- chrome, black chrome, and gold.
- They feature an internal mechanism whereby when one squeezes the capo, the neck-gripping mechanism opens against internal spring pressure, and releasing the capo results in the spring pressure closing the grip on the neck (see the photos below).

- They come with a set of changeable inserts for the part that presses down on the strings. These inserts have different radii so as to match the fretboard radius of individual brands of guitars. Who knew that different guitars have different radii for their fretboards? OK, maybe you luthiers out there knew... This is one of their selling points, and the claim is made that this feature results in less going out of tune when using the Thalia capo.

Here are pictures of the Thalia capo from their web site and a photo of mine (I chose the gold finish with sunburst wood inlay)-



As far as I can determine, these capos are not sold by stores, either brick-and-mortar or on the internet. They appear to only be available from the manufacturer's web site, www.thaliacapos.com.

So how does it work? Here are my impressions. It appears to be well-made, and is a heavy-feeling piece of hardware. The inlay feature looks really good. It can be put on the neck from either side, whichever way is most comfortable. It takes a healthy squeeze to release the neck grip to either put it on or take it off, but I'd say not uncomfortably so. My hands are not that muscular, and I can manage it (easier than a clean bar chord on a 12-string, which I can't quite do). I have my doubts about the Thalia claim that their capo eliminates or comes close to eliminating the going-out-of-tune problem. My guitar still has the low E string in particular going sharp with the capo. However, it does seem to vary with the placement of the capo. Midpoint between the frets seems the worst, and putting the capo almost on top of the fret is better. As the saying goes, your mileage may vary... My other observation is that the somewhat larger bulk of this capo results in my hand sometimes making contact with it (when the capo is placed close to the fret), which I did not experience with my other capo, which is one of the Shubb over-center cam-action types.

Did I mention that these capos are not cheap? Mine was around \$80, but some models are a little less, but still expensive. I suspect most of the extra cost is probably due to the custom inlay feature. My bottom line is that the Thalia is a great-looking accessory that can be customized with your favorite finish and inlay, but I'm not so sure that its performance is noticeably better than other capos, i.e. at least for me and my guitar it may not be the "magic bullet". It is good-looking, though....
