

I recently chanced to view a low-budget campy sci-fi movie which demonstrated the important benefits of music. In the movie, general Tritus was sent to earth with a virus to be used to exterminate earthlings so his people, living on the doomed planet, Hondo, could come and repopulate the earth. Alas, his space ship crashed as it arrived on earth and he had to go to a big-box store for supplies. Within the store he heard music for the first time, and he was overwhelmed. General Tritus goes on to buy various musical instruments gains and proficiency as a banjo player. He is also assimilated into earth culture.

It turns out this is a parable for all of us earthlings.

Music can provide many benefits to the individual and make positive changes to the brain chemistry. One need not be a player of an instrument. The benefits are achieved by those who listen and learn the melodies. It turns out there are benefits simply by anticipating a phrase to come and then hearing it. For those shade-tree and formally trained music makers, there is the cross brain chemistry and neural networking benefits that come from using both hands in one objective. Aside from using both hands, there is the process involved in committing to memory lyrics and melodies. This requires the music perceived by the left side of the brain storing it to the right side of the brain.

Some benefits of music are simple and direct. Consider Alzheimer patients who are institutionalized. For them, they are in an unfamiliar place surrounded by unfamiliar people. This can be most overwhelming even when care is done well. The hearing of a familiar melody can do much to give them a sense of place and contribute to their well being. It provides a familiarity in otherwise very strange surroundings.

It is good to know that listening to music is such a positive experience and is gluten and sugar free!



When the editor of the CPR, Cehlena Solus, asked me to write an article about this instrument maker, Jim Morris, I said agreed. I read the article about him that appeared in the Oldtime Central newsletter. Through the magic of the wonderful technology available to all of us, I submit this link which includes a well written story and video: Profile of Jim Morris, instrument maker

I hope you enjoy the article as I have. As a shade tree musician and wannabe instrument maker, I am qualified to prattle onward with my observations.

It turns out there is a wonderful tradition and long history of instrument makers who used whatever materials were available to them. For example, it was discovered that the Neanderthal bone flute was designed to play in the pentatonic scale. In



other words, it would be able to play an arrangement of Amazing Grace, a melody written in the pentatonic (5 note) scale.



Blind Willie Johnson learned to play on an instrument given to him by his father, a single string diddley bow. Later, his song *Dark Was the Night, Cold was the Ground*, went out into the galaxy on the Voyager spacecraft.

Jimmy Driftwood, who wrote, *Tennessee Stud* and *Battle of New Orleans*, was a history teacher for many years. He made a guitar from a scrap fence wood.



One of our past HFMS presidents, Lane Goldsmith, made a guitar from wood reclaimed from a chest of drawers.



Working with one's hands can be very rewarding in itself. In the making of an instrument, there is the anticipation of how it will sound. Sometimes, one is disappointed and other times, one can be surprised and pleased. There is also the experience that comes

to pass when one's progress is stymied by lack of knowledge and experience only to have a solution present itself in some unexpected moment.

In the event, that you may be infected by the desire to build a musical instrument there is help out in the online world at several levels. There is <u>C B Gitty</u> and <u>MGB Guitars</u> for entry level builders. <u>Amazon</u> will offer parts such as tuning keys, bridges, pickups and such. <u>Steward MacDonald</u> has high level components and kits available along with paint kits to achieve sun-burst finishes. You can make a diddley bow with a soda can, a broom stick and a couple of screws. There is no limit in simplicity or sophistication.

<u>Tom Chapin</u> has a wonderful song, <u>Music Made by Hand</u>, (at 10:05 on the <u>video</u>) about family and the passing down of musical traditions, that have meaning on an even deeper level dating back to the times of Neanderthal society.



A song about cold weather seemed to be in order. This traditional ballad about Lord John Franklin's ill-fated expedition in 1845 to find a Northwest Passage around the pole is one of my favorites. There were a great many recordings on YouTube to choose from – some by big "names" like Sinead O'Connor and Pentangle. I liked this version by Andy Toman, which you can hear at https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=RqGpU33j4AA, or on the HFMS Audio Archive page at http://www.houstonfolkmusic.org/HFS Audio Archive.html. As with all traditional songs, you'll find the wording varies from version to version as much as the musicians performing them.






To find a passage around the Pole


